Publications

With the assistance of the Publications Office, the Membership Office continues to publish *News & Notes*, the quarterly Members' magazine. The fall 2010 issue (no. 207) featured an indepth preview of the special exhibit Visible Language: Inventions of Writing in the Ancient Middle East and Beyond, as well as the annual Chicago House Bulletin. Winter 2010 (no. 208) highlighted the Institute's three main dictionary projects, the Chicago Assyrian Dictionary, Chicago Demotic Dictionary, and Chicago Hittite Dictionary. In spring 2011 (no. 209), the magazine provided Members with a preview of the special exhibit Before the Pyramids: The Origins of Egyptian Civilization. Finally, in summer 2010 (no. 210) Members were treated to a report of the first season of excavation at the Institute's newest field project, the Jericho Mafjar Project, in the West Bank. Since October of 2009, the Membership Office has been publishing the *E-Tablet*, our enewsletter, with great success. Almost 7,000 friends and supporters of the Oriental Institute receive the *E-Tablet*, which keeps them up to date with news, events, and announcements. The *E-Tablet* is published on the first Tuesday of every month and is free to the public. Marketing

With the support and assistance of Emily Teeter and Carole Krucoff, the Membership Office has participated in a grant-funded study to conduct membership and visitor research to better understand the various audiences we serve as a museum and research institute. In January and February of 2011, seven long-term Members agreed to participate in an in-depth phone interview administered by Slover-Linett Strategies, an audience research and planning group. The qualitative results of these interviews are invaluable in that they provide insight into both motivations for why Members initially join the Institute, and why they become long-term Members and supporters. Results indicate that Members are intrigued by our research and field projects, are life-time learners, and view membership communication vehicles (News & Notes, the E-Tablet, and the Annual Report) as well-organized and valuable resources to stay up to date on Institute news while strengthening their connection to the Institute's mission. Student Memberships

As part of the University of Chicago's Art Pass program the Oriental Institute began offering free membership to all University students in May 2010. As of June 2011, the Institute had over 600 University of Chicago student members, more than any other campus organization. To manage this new and rapidly growing program, the Membership Office hired two incredibly talented graduate student interns, Brittany Wheeler and Emily Pavell. Through partnerships with the Office of Publication and the Museum, the Membership Office was able to host several successful student member events throughout the year:

- Treasures of the Oriental Institute (September 2010) a tour of the Museum for new college students as part of OI Week activities (co-sponsored by Public Education, Museum, and Volunteer Program)
- Study at the OI (December 2010 and March and June 2011) quarterly, late-night study hall hosted in the Museum galleries
- Tell Night (February 2011) fantasy archaeology camp and learning opportunity in the Kipper Family Archaeology Discovery Center (co-sponsored by the KADC and Public Education)
- Indy Film Fest (April 2011) month-long film festival featuring all four of the Indiana Jones films in Breasted Hall, with an introduction by Yorke Rowan and Morag Kersel

In total, we hosted over 1,000 university students at the Institute during the academic year through these special events and programs. The student membership program aims to increase student awareness of the Oriental Institute, make the Oriental Institute an integral part of the student and campus experience at the University, and become active participant in student events.

Members' Events would not be possible without the hard work of many dedicated Oriental Institute staff members and volunteers, and the Membership Office is thankful for all their assistance with a very successful 2010–2011 events season.

Travel

In the past year the Oriental Institute offered two travel programs to the Middle East. In October 2010 Yorke Rowan escorted eight travelers to Israel in the travel program The Holy Land: Heritage of Humanity. This travel program provided a comprehensive look at Israel, from prehistoric burial sites to the modern-day architecture of Tel Aviv, and included a private tour of Marj Rabba, the Oriental Institute's newest excavation in Israel. Unfortunately, due to political unrest in Egypt in the winter and spring of 2011, Robert K. Ritner's sold-out March 2011 travel program, The Wonders of Ancient Egypt, had to be canceled. Thankfully, registration for a 2012 tour of the same name and itinerary is currently underway. In addition to canceling our March 2011 Egypt tour, we also had to cancel our September 2011 tour, In the Footsteps of the Hittites: Turkey and Syria, as political unrest and violence continues to plague Syria. We hope to be able to reschedule this tour, led by Theo van den Hout, in the near future. In addition to our March 2012 Egypt tour, we are excited to announce a unique tour opportunity in collaboration with the Archaeological Institute of America, the Explorers Club, and Zeghram Travel. Voyage through the Red Sea: Jordan, Egypt, Saudi Arabia, Sudan & Eritera will be led by Oriental Institute Research Associate Emily Teeter along with other expert lecturers, and will explore an astounding array of archeological sites along the Red Sea. Travelers will cruise the sea aboard the comfortably elegant Clipper Odyssey. The tour is scheduled to depart on November 6, 2011; registration for this program is currently ongoing.

Oriental Institute travel programs are unique in that our passengers experience exclusive site visits and on-site learning privileges not enjoyed by other institutions or travel groups. Our Members learn directly from some of the most eminent scholars in the world, at sites the Oriental Institute has been working on and researching for almost a century.
